Heriot-Watt University powers ahead in influential Times and Sunday Times rankings

Heriot-Watt University has significantly risen in The Times and Sunday Times Good University Guide 2026, now ranking 39th out of 130 United Kingdom (UK) institutions, climbing from 51st in the previous year. The University was also named runner-up for the title of Scottish University of the Year.

The improvement is mirrored in many of our University's academic disciplines, with six subjects placed in the UK's top ten. Leading the way is Building, which has been ranked first in the UK.

Other highly placed subjects include Mathematics (5th), Mechanical Engineering (7th), Town & Country Planning and Landscape (7th), Aeronautical and Manufacturing Engineering (8th), and Chemical Engineering (10th).

The Good University Guide is widely regarded as one of the UK's most influential university rankings. It assesses institutions across eight key measures including teaching quality, student satisfaction, graduate job prospects, and research excellence, providing a trusted benchmark for prospective students and their families when making choices about higher education.

This year's strong performance follows a series of accolades for the University. Later this year, Heriot-Watt University will vie for the coveted title of University of the Year 2025 at the prestigious Times Higher Education Awards, as the only Scottish institution to be shortlisted. In addition, the University rose 17 places to 25th in the latest Complete University Guide and moved up to 31st in the Guardian University Guide 2026.

The Small Acts and Big Hearts Powering Malaysia's Merdeka Spirit









Malaysia marks 68 years of independence this 31 August, but the spirit of Merdeka is proving to be more than a historic milestone. Across the country, young Malaysians are keeping its meaning alive through small acts of kindness and community service that embody freedom, compassion and solidarity.

At Heriot-Watt University Malaysia (HWUM), students participating in the EmPOWER Programme have translated their sense of purpose into tangible, positive change. From January to July 2025, their fundraising activities have raised nearly RM100,000, benefiting 11 charities nationwide.

One standout initiative was the Mini Golf, Major Impact project, which transformed the university plaza into a lively mini-golf course. The event raised RM5,400 to support Epic Homes, an organisation providing housing for Orang Asli families.

The students' compassion also extended to animal welfare. Through virtual runs, bazaars and online campaigns, they collected more than $RM_{17,000}$ for the PAWS Animal Welfare Society.

Many volunteers went beyond fundraising, spending time at shelters to feed cats, clean cages and assist with adoptions. As one student put it, "We realised that even a small effort can bring real

Inclusivity was another theme that ran through their work. To support the Malaysian Association for the Blind (MAB), students organised a blindfold challenge, allowing peers to experience life without sight. Alongside a table tennis tournament and creative bazaars, these efforts raised RM13,500.

Recognising that millions of Malaysian children face the risks of poverty, the students also championed the cause of Yayasan Chow Kit (YCK).

Through community sports and bazaars, they raised more than RM15,000 to provide food, education, and safe environments for vulnerable children. By doing so, they upheld Merdeka's promise of dignity and justice for future generations

A nation at the crossroads







In a 1993 study titled Ripe for Rivalry: Prospects for Peace in a Multipolar Asia, $published \ in \ the \ journal \ International \ Security, American \ political \ scientist \ Aaron \ L.$ Friedberg argued that Asia appeared more likely than Europe to be the "cockpit of great-power conflict", concluding that in the long run, "Europe's past could be Asia's

Three decades later, reality has proven otherwise. Since the 1990s, Europe has $experienced \ several \ conflicts \ in \ Bosnia, Croatia, Kosovo, Albania, Macedonia, Georgia$ and Ukraine.

In the same period, there was no major conflict in Asia, despite lacking the interconnectedness enjoyed by their European counterparts.

What explains this relative peace? According to geopolitical expert Kishore Mahbubani, who served as Singapore's permanent representative to the United Nations for more than a decade and as UN Security Council president between 2001 and 2002, the simple answer is that Asia benefits from a culture of pragmatism, as demonstrated by the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean), which emerged as a successful regional organisation at the end of the Cold War.

Mahbubani seems to recognise the contributions of an alternative leadership style, built

As Malaysia prepares to table Budget 2026, we are at an important crossroad. 

Budget 2026 crucial for Malaysia's higher education global competitiveness



KUALA LUMPUR: Budget 2026 represents a defining moment for Malaysia's higher education sector with crucial decisions needed to ensure the country's ability to compete on the global stage, said Heriot-Watt University Malaysia provost and chief executive officer Prof

In a statement, he said last year's RM18 billion allocation to higher education was a positive step, but the rapidly changing economic landscape calls for greater ambition and forward-

"Budget 2026 should not only sustain current funding levels but also prioritise nurturing graduates who are innovative, inclusive, and resilient. These qualities will determine Malaysia's long-term success," he said.

Mushtak, who is also the Vice Chancellors Council for Private Universities (VCCPU) chairman, оно спортиванее unat internationalisation must remain a priority, highlighting Malaysia's steady growth in international student enrolments, particularly from China, Indonesia and India.

Citing data from Study Malaysia and Education Malaysia Global Services, he said the country is on track to meet the 250,000 international student target by 2025.

"To build on this, the government should introduce targeted incentives to attract more students, especially to private institutions. This will boost Malaysia's global standing while generating economic benefits," he added.

On research and innovation, Mushtak urged support for "blue-sky" research, which may not have immediate applications but has the potential for breakthroughs, stressing its importance in building a knowledge-driven economy

"Increased funding and stronger academia-industry partnerships will create a dynamic research ecosystem that fosters creativity, discovery and leadership," he said, adding that investment in virtual platforms, smart campus infrastructure and digital tools is critical to prepare students for a workforce that values flexibility and personalised learning.

Apart from that, Mushtak said supporting neurodiverse and disabled learners is not only a moral obligation but also a way to unlock hidden talent and dedicated funding as well as policies will promote accessibility to ensure equal opportunities for all Malaysians.

To enhance education quality and global recognition, he recommended establishing unified national quality frameworks and incentives to align local institutions with international standards, which would improve graduate employability and raise the global reputation of Malaysian universities.

He also urged Malaysia to lead in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) and Artificial Intelligence (AI), saying that investing in both fields would equip the next generation with the skills to lead in an increasingly technology-driven world as they are the backbone of future innovation and economic growth.

"Budget 2026 is not just about numbers, it is an opportunity to invest in Malaysia's future. At Heriot-Watt University, we are committed to working with the government and partners to achieve this vision and ensure Malaysian universities continue to thrive globally," he added. - $\mbox{\it Bernama}$

The competition was held on 4 October 2025 attracting participants from public, private, and international schools across Malaysia.

The championship was structured into three progressive rounds, each designed to test the participants' knowledge and skills in accounting, economics and general business knowledge. The first two rounds were conducted online, taking place from 15 to 19 September and 24 to 26 September, respectively. The final round was held on 4 October 2025, and only the best 50 finalists were selected to the Malaysia campus for a face-to-face showdown.

The winners were judged based on their accuracy and speed in solving the accountancy problems. In the individual category, first place was awarded to Sean Lim Chi Hao from A&O Centre of Excellence, Johor, followed by Gan Ian Mark Ming Jin from Prime International Secondary School, Selangor in second place, and Claire Lau Xin Yii from SMK Tengku Panglima Perang Tengku Muhammad, Pahang, who secured third place.

For the educational institution category, Sri Sempurna International School in Kuala Lumpur emerged as the top school, with Han Chiang High School in Penang taking second place, and Shen Jai High School in Perak finishing in third.

Congratulations to Malcolm Isaac Fernandez , our James-Watt PhD Scholar for research publication in Energy and Renewable Energy – Elsevier Q1 Journals, entitled "Development and analysis of national energy system scenarios for Malaysia's energy transition towards net zero" and "Modelling and development of utility-scale energy system for Malaysia with advanced energy balance analysis: Supply, demand and trade."

This work was guided by an international supervisory team comprising Associate Professor Dr Yun li Go, Associate Professor Dr Wolf-Gerrit Fruh and Professor M.L. Dennis Wong. This research demonstrates the modelling of future energy system scenarios for Malaysia towards 2050.

A prestigious milestone: Lim Wei Xiang passes CFA Level 1

Lim Wei Xiang, a second-year Business and Finance student, has successfully completed the Chartered Financial Analyst (CFA) Level 1 exam, one of the most globally respected and demanding qualifications in the finance and investment sector.

The CFA designation is recognised in over 165 countries, and passing Level 1 is a significant achievement. The May 2025 session recorded a global pass rate of just 45%, reflecting the exam's challenging nature.

Wei Xiang's ability to balance intensive exam preparation alongside his full academic workload is a testament to his dedication, discipline, and determination. His success also highlights the strong foundation provided by our Business and Finance programme, which equips students with the knowledge and skills required to thrive in professional finance environments.



Heriot-Watt University Malaysia students shine at Tech4Good Challenge

Our Malaysia Campus proudly celebrates the remarkable success of its students at the Tech4Good Challenge (T4G) 2025, a prestigious national-level invention competition organised by ViTrox Technologies and University Tunku Abdul Rahman (UTAR).

This year, our talented team from the MEng Electrical and Electronics Engineering program stood out among 200 competing teams nationwide, securing the 2nd Runner-Up position in Category 2 (Tertiary) – Manufacturing Track and taking home RM1,000 in prize money.

The team is comprised of Loh Yue Hung, Yong Zi Cheng, and Sim Jun Heng, all first-year students under the guidance of Dr. Yew Weng Kean, Assistant Professor at the School of Engineering and Physical Sciences (EPS).

Their winning project, titled 'Integrated Vision Inspection System (IVIS),' introduced a breakthrough solution to optimize Quality Assurance and Quality Control (QAQC) in the aircraft manufacturing industry. The system integrates Al-powered defect detection using the YOLOv8 model; natural language interaction via the DeepSeek LLM; a custom photogrammetry technique for precise 3D reconstruction of component surfaces; and IoT-enabled real-time data transmission and automated reporting.



The team's journey to the grand finals would not have been possible without the strong support of EmPOWER and the School of Engineering and Physical Sciences.

This dual achievement reaffirms the University's commitment to nurturing future-ready graduates and fostering a culture of innovation and excellence. Congratulations to both teams for making us proud!

Since its inception in 2023, T4G has served as an inspiring platform for Malaysian students to showcase innovation and creativity in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).
